

# EDITORIAL.

# SCHOOL NOTES.

A year ago the war took from us three of our remaining five masters. It was with much regret that we parted from Mr. Annett, Mr. Baldwin and Mr. Mayne, all of whom left us last Easter to take up work in the Anti-aircraft Service. We are now very sorry to learn that by the end of the term both Mr. Auger and Mr. Paull will have left us also.

Our best wishes go with all these masters, and we earnestly hope for their safe return.

Of the masters who left us at the beginning of the war we hear now regularly only from Mr. Adams. When he last wrote he had been in hospital for a month, with rheumatism, but was then back in the trenches. Once more we wish him good luck.

It was with much grief that we learnt last term that Mr. Swallow had been "wounded and missing" since the beginning of August. Nothing has been heard of him since, and we can only conclude that he, too, has sacrificed his life while fighting for his country. All who knew Mr. Swallow will receive this news with sorrow. He was most popular, well loved, and respected by us all.

We have also received news of twenty of our Old Boys, who have given up their lives in the service of their country, and to all their relatives and friends we offer our sincerest sympathies.

We are sure that everyone will congratulate Eric Hole on having won the Military Medal for conspicuous gallantry out in France. He is the first of our Old Boys to gain such a distinction. Since going to press we learn that Percy Benda has also been awarded this Medal.

Since the last issue of our Magazine we have had several visits from Old Boys now serving with the Colours. Walter Makins and Arthur Herring came up to see us last term while on leave from the Front, and received a warm welcome. G. H. Jacob obtained a commission in the Royal Flying Corps last June, while still in the School, and is now in France. He has twice been home on leave, and has each time paid us a flying visit. Extracts from his interesting letters have been read to us in the hall, and we have been delighted to hear of his narrow escapes.

At the beginning of the present term we were pleased to see Bernard Finlayson, who, after being trained at Sandhurst, has received a commission in the Seaforth Highlanders. Gate and Evans, too, who have joined the Merchant Service, paid a short visit to the School a few days ago. They were on leave after a trip to America, about which they had much of interest to relate.

During the year Mrs. Paull, Miss Martin, and Mrs. Auger have joined the staff of mistresses, and we have been glad to welcome them all. Miss Martin took

the place of Miss Stone, who left us at the end of July, to be married. Mrs. Gratton is now in America, in Iowa, and sends us a glowing description of her new home and the delights of the surrounding country. Her accounts of the sun that is always shining, and the skies that are always blue, make some of us long to join her, to say nothing of the minor joys of fried chicken and ice-cream in abundance which she promised to anyone who would pay her a Christmas visit.

Our thanks are due to Mr. Carpenter for some presents which he has kindly made to the School during the year. These include a model of a small electric motor, which was first shown in the 1851 Exhibition, and a useful cabinet for the collection of specimens.

We have to thank Mr. and Mrs. Finlayson for kindly offering a cup to the School in memory of their son, Denis Finlayson, who lost his life in France last September.

Both Libraries continue to increase their numbers. Since March, 1916, forty-two books have been added to the Senior Library, and thirty-three to the Junior. Among these new books are to be found several dealing with some aspect of the war, which have proved to be quite popular reading.

We wish to thank the ex-Librarians, Hilda Ustonson and Olive Evans, as well as Kathleen Collier and E. R. Collier, for kindly giving us two books each this term. We are always most glad to receive in this way books suitable for the Library from present members of the School, or from those who have left us.

Owing to the darkness of the streets at night and other inconveniences, the Cercle Francais have only been able to meet together once this term. Even then we were compelled to hold separate meetings for the lower and upper sixth forms. Both these meetings were most enjoyable, however, and we hope soon to be able to gather together once more. Though we do not guarantee that good French is the only language spoken, it cannot be denied that these meetings have helped us greatly to throw off our natural English "shyness," and so promote greater fluency in the mastering of the intricacies of the French tongue.

During past years either the boys' or girls' swimming team has often been fortunate enough to secure the Swimming Shield offered by the Broomfield Park Club for competition among local schools. This year, however, for the first time, we can congratulate both teams on their success in this event.

The School will close for the Easter holidays on Wednesday, April 4th. The summer term begins on April 24th, and ends on July 25th. Whit-Monday and Whit-Tuesday will be holidays.

# THE CONCERT AND PRIZE-GIVING.

The Annual Concert and Prize-giving was held on Thursday, December 14th. The hall was quite filled, although the concert had been given to a large assembly the preceding evening. A charge of three-pence for programmes was again made, and at the end of the evening the school fund for the Middlesex Regiment was larger by £6 8s. 3d.

In the Head Master's report, with which the proceedings began, attention was first drawn to the losses which the school has sustained. Dr. Vivian, to whom our existence as a school is very largely due, is no longer with us. Mr. Swallow, who had been 2nd Lieutenant in the 1st King's Liverpool Regiment, after having been twice wounded, was lost sight of forever on August 8th, 1916. Nineteen of our Old Boys have fallen in the war.

Reference was then made to G. H. Jacob, who has a commission in the Royal Flying Corps, and to W. E. Hole, who has been awarded the Military Medal.

In spite of the fact that the staff is considerably depleted, the successes gained during the year were unprecedented. G. H. Jacob has gained a Scholarship for Science and Mathematics at the East London College, and a Senior County Scholarship. Elsie Goldstone has gained an Exhibition for Mathematics at Newnham College, Cambridge; and Margery Matthews was successful in her Intermediate Arts Examination. Of the eighteen boys and girls who entered for the London University Senior School Examination eighteen passed, each obtaining, in addition, a Matriculation Certificate, while ten of the candidates gained Honours Certificates. This record of Honours Certificates was beaten by no other Middlesex County School, and by one school only out of all the schools that entered for the examinations.

In its sports the school has been no less successful than in its work. Both of the B.P.S.C. swimming shields were secured by the School teams. In the Inter-school Sports, Eldridge gained second place in the half-mile and first place in the quarter-mile. The girls have again won the Hockey Cup and the football team has never known a more successful season.

The Head Master's report was followed by an address by Councillor Godwin, the Chairman. He referred to the death of Dr. Vivian, and exhorted the scholars to follow the splendid example of our Old Boys, whose watchword had been "Devotion to Duty."

The Rev. D. J. Thomas, M.A., Principal of the Home and Colonial Training College, kindly distributed the certificates, and afterwards gave a most interesting address.

A vote of thanks to Principal Thomas and to the Chairman, proposed by Councillor Grant, and seconded by Councillor Hole, brought the first half of the programme to a conclusion. Songs by the choir, both English and French, were very much appreciated, and the scholars from the lower forms charmed us with their pretty singing, while the scenes from Molière's "L'Avare" were excellently presented.

An innovation, in the form of an interlude from "A Midsummer Night's Dream," proved to be as amusing as it was successful. But the crowning joke was the presentation of a gorgeous bouquet to the surprised yet unabashed Thisbe.

"Widdicombe Fair," which was performed by the prefects, evoked very hearty laughter, and the chorus has seldom been sung by merrier voices.

In spite of the unadorned platform and closely covered windows, the concert, which the National Anthem then brought to an end, was one of the brightest we have ever enjoyed.

# THE SCIENTIFIC SOCIETY.

In consequence of the abnormal conditions under which we have, for some time past, been working, no meetings of the above Society have been held since last Spring term; and the visits to museums and other places of scientific interest, which had been proposed for the summer term, had also to be abandoned, much to the regret of the members who had been eagerly awaiting them.

No more meetings will be held until after the conclusion of the war, when it is to be hoped that this popular movement will meet with as much success as was achieved last year.

# ENGLISH DEBATING SOCIETY.

The Society's meetings were suspended last term owing to the early darkness and lighting restrictions. The first debate this season was held on Monday, January 29th, "That war is inevitable" was announced to be the subject for discussion.

Herber opened for the motion with the statement that war is caused chiefly by jealousy and ambition. These elements are inherent in human nature everywhere. To end war for ever would mean the complete changing of humanity. And that is sheer impossibility.

Speaking for the opposition, Ina Girdwood expressed the belief that the people at large do not want war. If we have learnt to dispense with personal feuds, why can we not learn to do without international ones?

Hall and Martin seconded Herber, and Watson thought that war is as conquerable as any other disease.

Ardent discussion followed. Those for the motion maintained that war is inevitable so long as men, and therefore nations, are humanly imperfect, while those for the opposition held the belief that, with the improvement in education, the advance of civilisation, and the larger part played by women in the affairs of the world, arbitration will supersede war.

The motion was won by five votes.

# SCHOOL GARDENS.

During the year a change took place in the School gardens, for they were put to the use so much advocated in these days when all are urged to "grow more food and eat less food." The order beds remained unaltered, and attempts were made to establish in them various new plants, but conditions for this were not very favourable. The other beds were cleared and prepared under manifold difficulties, for all too often the ground was too wet and heavy to be touched. The gardeners

gardened, however, with infinite patience and right goodwill, until at last neat rows of peas, beans and other vegetables stood shyly forth in the beds that had known perhaps fairer, but not more welcome, occupants. Even then the difficulties were not over, for the summer was so cold and damp that some of the crops matured in the holidays, whilst others, deprived of encouragement, gave up the unequal struggle, or so far that they forgot the ways of their forbears, and developed most strange characteristics. For future reference we note that carrots and turnips are easily discouraged, that peas and beans are not to be trusted, that spinach and onions have a disconcerting way of becoming as nought, and that cabbages and lettuces alas! frequently lose heart. Nevertheless, 1917 found us with a balance in hand, and with a still unexhausted stock of energy and hope, all to be devoted to the growing of potatoes. If the pressing needs of the nation inspire our soil and our weather in the same way as they inspire the workers, all will be well.

# THE ATHLETIC SPORTS, 1916.

The annual Athletic Sports were held on the School Ground on Saturday, 17th June.

Although the weather was glorious, the attendance was not so good this year, because the Grovelands Hospital was opened on the same day. For once in our history we were glad there was a smaller attendance, for the School has no desire to interfere with the noble work carried out by the V.A.D.

The standard of sport was not in any way lowered, and three school records were broken by the boys, two in the Junior events by T. Cole, who increased the Long Jump record to 14ft. 9½in., and the High Jump to 4ft. 3in., and one in the Senior events by H. Frampton, who by throwing the cricket ball 73 yds. 10in. created a school record for that event. The task of mapping out the field and arranging the events was a big one this year on account of the dearth of Masters owing to the war, and our best thanks are due to Mr. Paull, who arranged everything admirably.

The programmes were again sold to realise money for the Middlesex Regiment Fund, and as a result the sum of £6 was raised. The winners of the Girls' Championship, the Old Girls' Race, the Victor Ludorum, and the Junior Championship again received laurel wreaths, charmingly plaited by the girls, in place of cups, in order that the money might swell the above Fund.

One prominent feature of the Sports was the appearance of some of our khaki-clad Old Boys, whom we were glad to welcome back to the School again.

# INTER-SCHOOL SPORTS.

The Third Annual Athletic Inter-School Sports were held at the Stamford Bridge Sports Ground on July 20th, 1916. Fifteen secondary schools sent in representatives, and for the first time the School gained some points in the Senior events, Eldridge gaining first position in the Quarter-Mile (57 4-5 secs.), and second position in the Half-Mile. Smith also gained two points in the Junior 220 yards, thus creating a record for the aggregate of points gained by the School.

At the Harrow County School Sports held on July 22nd, we entered two representatives, Stapleton and L. Ward, for the Invitation Race. In the two previous seasons we had secured the first position and the cup, but unfortunately we only succeeded in gaining the second and third positions this year. We hope to be able to regain the cup next year.

# RIFLE CLUB NOTES.

Since last year's issue of the Magazine, the Rifle Club continued its successful career till the end of the School year in July last. After that, however, it has had an uphill fight due to many of its old members leaving and to the great increase in the price of ammunition. These factors reduced the membership by about a half, and now that Mr. Paull, the President, has had to leave us, it was decided to close the club for the time being.
