We, as a School community, share the national problem of re-construction. During the last four years many of our School activities were thrust into the background by the exigencies of war. The present issue of the School Magazine marks another advance in the resumption of our normal school life.

It is impossible to record all the events of the long period since last we saw publication. With the exception of Mr. Swallow, whose loss we shall always deeply regret, all the Masters are back with us again. We are also glad to see Miss House again with us, and to welcome back Miss Barham. We hope to see Miss Aldridge and Miss Chaney soon restored to health.

We are not the first wave in the tide of re-construction. Already the Old Boys' Association has re-started with gratifying enthusiasm. We welcome this re-forging of the link between Past and Present. The last year also saw the inauguration of the "Parents and Staff Association."

THE SCHOOL LIBRARIES,

Many additions have been made to the Libraries during the year. Among these we have to acknowledge the gift of 26/- in the form of War Savings Stamps given to us by the Local Committee for the Peace Day Celebrations, and also six books from Margery Hill, which she presented on leaving School last July.

Owing to the increased numbers in the School, and the fact that the price of books in the Everyman Edition is nearly three times the original cost, the difficulty of supplying enough books to satisfy our readers is constantly growing. We, therefore, make an urgent appeal to our members, especially to those leaving School, to help us as much as they can by giving a donation or by presenting books, suitable for School reading, which are in good condition and are no longer wanted by their owners.

Our best thanks are due to those girls who have given much time and energy to their work as Librarians, especially to Alice Thompson and Kathleen Rice, who, during Miss Aldridge's absence, have managed the Senior Library themselves.

We most gratefully acknowledge a gift of a number of books from Mr. Hanman, which we hope will form the nucleus of an Historical Library.

FOOTBALL, 1919-20.

The general standard of play greatly improved during the course of the past season, the understanding between the players being really sound at the end of the season. Some excellent football was produced by the Inter-House matches, and the results in points were very close.

Generally speaking, the forwards of both the 1st and 2nd Elevens lacked the ability to convert their opportunities in front of their opponents' goal.

Whayman, H. W.—A hard-working Captain and one of the best forwards the School has produced.

Bigg, P.-Ably supported his Captain; played a sound game as centre-half.

Burdge, R. H.-A steady half-back who plays a hard game.

Payne, F. V.-A fast outside-right who centres well.

Atkinson, J. W.—An inside-right who has continued to improve in form, but lacks shooting ability.

Huckstepp, F. S.-A sound goal-keeper.

Wiggins, A.-Made a good Captain of the 2nd Eleven.

OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION.

After an interval of five years, an effort has been made to resuscitate the Association, which had so successful a career before the War.

The formality of a General Meeting had first to be arranged, and this took place at the School on January 31st. A Committee, consisting of Messrs. H. A. Paull, A. E. Hendry, R. G. Allan, F. Marsh, A. E. Davey, A. A. Thomson, and R. B. Oram, was formed, and Mr. Warren was asked to resume the office of President of the Association.

With the assistance of several members of the Old Girls' Association the first affair, which took the form of a dance, was held on February 14th. The initial effort had the support of Sir William and Lady Glyn-Jones and Mr. and Mrs. B. S. Gott. Although the War has taken a heavy toll of Old Boys, there were several of the original members of the School present, and, apart from the dancing, a great deal of time was spent in the exchange of reminiscences. After supper, Mr. Warren made a brief announcement, explaining the objects of the Association. The evening closed with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

The second affair—a Whist Drive, for which the new Association was responsible—took place on March 26th. To this the "Old Girls" were invited. Supper, which this time had been arranged with the help of Mrs. Stone—a member of the Parents and Staff Association Committee—proved an opportunity for many reminiscences, until the man with the bell set things moving again. The first ladies' prize went to Beatrice Girdwood, and the first gentlemen's to E. J. Briscoe.

It was encouraging to note that several Old Boys came some distance in order to be present; among others, R. C. T. Petty and E. B. Addison came down from Cambridge.

During the Easter Holidays the Memorial to the Old Boys who had fallen in the War was placed in the School Hall. Out of respect to their memory the Committee decided that affairs of the Association during the Summer Term must be limited to the School ground.

A Tennis Tournament is being arranged for June 12th, in which members of both the Old Boys' and Old Girls' Associations will take part.

In the Autumn, the Committee will endeavour to make up for the late start last season, and a full programme of social events will be arranged. The experience which has been gained will ensure that the coming season will make the Association a part of the lives of those who have already joined, and an inducement to others to join their one-time School-fellows. The Committee, with the help of the President, have done much, but without the co-operation of all Old Boys it is impossible to make the Association the great success which it deserves to be. The subscription of 2/6 covers a free copy of each issue of the School Magazine, and a guarantee that each member shall be kept in touch with the affairs of the Association and informed of coming events.

The Committee expect that all Old Boys, by joining the Association, will make it possible for them to extend its activities and become the centre of interest and comradeship to the members. A great deal may be accomplished if those who receive a copy of this Magazine will inform old scholars of this Association, and of the object for which it has been formed.
